









Hepatitis Prevention And Control

It has been reported that 20 million people are infected with hepatitis B and C in Pakistan. Thousands of new patients are added every year due to the lack of prevention, testing, and treatment resources as well as inadequate screening during a blood transfusion, use of improperly sterilized invasive medical devices, and unsafe injection practices.

VFAHT is a force that aspires to create a Hepatitis-free community, by spreading awareness and exercising preventive interventions. It has been conducting different projects under the banner of the prevention and control program that includes orientation sessions for healthcare professionals, webinars, screening camps, awareness campaigns, and capacity building training.



Dengue has been an epidemic in metropolitan cities in Pakistan. Transmission typically occurs between July and November. VFAHT has been conducting various projects under the dengue prevention and control program to minimize the spread of dengue infection in Pakistan. It includes awareness camps, awareness campaigns, and mosquito net distribution drives.









Hepatitis, HIV, And Tuberculosis Health Camps

Pakistan ranks 2nd in Hepatitis and 5th in tuberculosis in the world. It is also facing a concentrated epidemic of HIV. Volunteer Force Against Hepatitis Transmission (VFAHT) is organizing 18 free health camps in 2021 in 16 cities of Pakistan. The health camps will comprise of screening counter (HBsAg, HCV ELISA, HIV ELISA, TB Skin Test), vaccination counter (Hep-B, EPI), and counseling and education counter. It will provide screening and immunization facilities to 6000 medical and dental students, healthcare professionals staff, and 12,000 people from different communities annually.





Mosquito Nets Distribution Drives

Dengue is more prevalent in the metropolitan cities across Pakistan. Karachi and Lahore are most significantly affected. Volunteer Force Against Hepatitis Transmission (VFAHT) is organizing free Mosquito Nets Distribution Drives in 2021 in 6 affected cities of Pakistan. These drives will be focused on the distribution of Long-lasting Insecticidal Mosquito Nets (LLINs), counseling, and awareness about EPI vaccination. It will help 6000 families per annum which are 30,000 people approximately.

Community awareness can create a major hurdle against dengue and can decrease the number of cases. People will be advised to use mosquito repellents, cover their arms and legs, particularly before sunrise and after sunset.






A group of volunteer is distributing Mosquito Nets to the villagers. (Allah Bachayo Rajar, Sindh)

Tuberculosis Awareness Seminars and Walks

World Tuberculosis Day is observed on 24th March every year to raise public awareness about the devastating health and social and economic consequences of Tuberculosis. Pakistan ranks fifth in the world with active tuberculosis patients and fourth in the world with Multi-Drug Resistant tuberculosis patients.

Volunteer Force Against Hepatitis Transmission (VFAHT) will celebrate this day every year at the medical institutions across Pakistan. They will conduct seminars, lectures, panel discussions, isolation precautions, and training workshops for healthcare workers and organize awareness walks. In 2021, more than 30 lectures, and 20 workshops will be conducted. It will help to enlighten students with new techniques and upgrade their knowledge.





Hepatitis Awareness Seminars and Walks

World Hepatitis Day (WHD) takes place every year on July 28, uniting the world under a single theme to raise awareness of the global burden of viral hepatitis and to influence real change. Pakistan is dealing with a heavy burden of viral hepatitis, with almost 20 million people suffering from hepatitis B and C in Pakistan.

Volunteer Force Against Hepatitis Transmission (VFAHT) is planning to organize multiple seminars with customized lectures, training, and workshops for medical and dental students in all chapters of VFAHT. It will also include interactive research-based activities for students. It aims to empower medical students into growing up as young physicians and health professionals in the clinical and preventive health sector.
